In Short

- The Narcotics Control Bureau recently held crucial quarterly meetings in Guwahati and Bhopal, bringing together various agencies to enhance collaborative strategies against drug trafficking and bolster intelligence sharing across the states

In a significant move to intensify the fight against narcotics, the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) recently concluded its Second Quarter State-Level Joint Coordination Committee Meetings for 2026. Convened earlier this week, the crucial deliberations took place in Guwahati for Assam and Bhopal for Madhya Pradesh, bringing together a consortium of enforcement agencies, officials confirmed on Friday.

The primary objective of these high-level meetings was to refine and strengthen coordinated strategies aimed at dismantling drug trafficking networks and enhancing intelligence sharing mechanisms. Discussions reportedly focused on several critical areas, including improving joint interrogations, conducting thorough financial investigations to trace illicit funds, executing synchronized enforcement operations, and ultimately, dismantling drug cartels operating across state lines.

Officials from various participating agencies reaffirmed their collective commitment to realizing the vision of a "Drug-Free India." The meetings saw broad participation from key national and state bodies. For instance, in the Bhopal meeting, it was jointly chaired by the NCB Deputy Director General (Western Region) and the Additional Director General of the Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF) for Madhya Pradesh. Representatives from the National Investigation Agency (NIA), Subsidiary Intelligence Bureau (SIB), Income Tax Department, Customs, Central Bureau of Narcotics (CBN), Railway Protection Force (RPF), State Prosecution Department, Food and Drug Administration, and State Excise Department were also present.

During the sessions, concrete plans were firmed up for the rigorous implementation of the Vision Document on Narcotics Control. Agencies also pledged to proactively address emerging drug trafficking trends prevalent in their respective regions, underscoring a unified approach to tackle the evolving challenges posed by illicit drug trade.

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New Delhi: Acting on Union Home Minister Amit Shah's directive to adopt a "whole-of-government" approach against narcotics, the Centre has significantly strengthened inter-agency coordination, bringing together more than 15 central and state enforcement, intelligence and regulatory agencies under the Narcotics Control Bureau's (NCB) Joint Coordination Committee (JCC) mechanism.

The intensified coordination was reflected in a series of state-level JCC meetings held across Assam, Madhya Pradesh, Punjab, Haryana, Chandigarh and Chhattisgarh in July, where agencies dealing with narcotics enforcement, border security, financial intelligence, taxation and counter-terrorism jointly reviewed major investigations and chalked out coordinated strategies to dismantle drug syndicates.

The strengthened mechanism follows Shah's directions issued during the apex narco-coordination centre (NCORD) meeting and the rollout of the Vision Document on Drug Control 2026-29, which calls for intelligence-led enforcement, financial investigations, coordinated prosecution and disruption of the complete narcotics ecosystem rather than isolated seizures.

Officials said the present framework now integrates agencies including the NCB, National Investigation Agency (NIA), Enforcement Directorate (ED), Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI), Customs, Central Board of Indirect Taxes formations including DGGI and CGST, Income Tax Department, Intelligence Bureau's Subsidiary Intelligence Bureau (SIB), Central Bureau of Narcotics (CBN), Railway Protection Force (RPF), Assam Rifles, Border Security Force (BSF), Indo-Tibetan Border Police (ITBP), State Anti-Narcotics Task Forces (ANTFs), State Excise Departments, Drug Controllers and State Police, besides financial intelligence platforms such as NATGRID and the Financial Intelligence Unit.

The latest JCC meeting held in Guwahati on Thursday, chaired by NCB Deputy Director General (North Eastern Region) R Sudhakar, witnessed participation from virtually the entire enforcement architecture in the Northeast.

Apart from reviewing emerging trafficking trends, the meeting focused on strengthening financial investigations, intelligence-led enforcement and dismantling the financial infrastructure of drug cartels. District Superintendents of Police across Assam also joined the deliberations virtually.

The meeting reviewed significant cases, including the seizure of 80,000 Yaba tablets in Sribhumi district, in which three accused were arrested, and the recovery of 669.734 kg of ganja concealed inside 111 cargo parcels at Lokpriya Gopinath Bordoloi International Airport, Guwahati, leading to the arrest of five persons.

On the same day, another JCC meeting in Bhopal brought together agencies including the NIA, SIB, Income Tax, Customs, Central Bureau of Narcotics, RPF, State Prosecution Department and Food and Drug Administration.

“The discussions during the Bhopal JCC meeting centred on monitoring major NDPS cases, dismantling clandestine drug laboratories, expediting preventive detention under the PIT-NDPS Act and conducting intelligence-led joint operations,” a senior NCB official told ETV Bharat on Friday.

Earlier this month, similar coordination meetings were held in Chandigarh for Punjab, Haryana and the Union Territory of Chandigarh, and in Raipur for Chhattisgarh. These meetings focused on Pakistan-backed cross-border trafficking networks, narco-gangster linkages, terror financing, financial investigations, money laundering, trial monitoring and greater use of technology platforms such as NIDAAN, NATGRID and the FIU Portal.

Coordination yielding results

Officials said the enhanced coordination has already translated into major operational successes over the past three months.

Among the most significant was Operation White Strike, in which the NCB seized 349 kg of cocaine worth about Rs 1,745 crore after a months-long intelligence-driven investigation involving coordinated action across multiple enforcement agencies to dismantle an international trafficking network.

Another breakthrough came under Operation Ragepill, during which investigators seized 227.7 kg of Captagon tablets valued at around Rs 182 crore, India's first major seizure of the synthetic drug. The operation expanded into financial investigations and international linkages involving multiple enforcement agencies.

In another coordinated action, the NCB and Chandigarh police busted a Pakistan-linked methamphetamine network, recovering methamphetamine, heroin and poppy straw while exposing cross-border trafficking routes and supply chains.

Officials said the JCC mechanism is increasingly enabling agencies to move beyond isolated seizures towards coordinated investigations that simultaneously target traffickers, financiers, hawala operators, logistics providers and organised crime networks.

“With more than 15 agencies now sharing intelligence, conducting joint interrogations and pursuing financial and terror-linked investigations under a common framework, it is expected that the integrated enforcement model will significantly strengthen the government’s campaign for a drug-free India,” the official added.

Yaba, crystal meth become the new narco currency

Bangladesh faces a growing drug crisis, with an estimated 8.2 million users. As the country does not produce narcotics, most are smuggled in from abroad. In a four-part series, The Daily Star explores the trafficking routes, the threats and the impacts of drug abuse. The second instalment looks at how drugs are used as a currency for illicit cross-border trade.

Bangladeshi smugglers have long supplied construction materials, fuel and food to armed groups in Myanmar's conflict-ridden Rakhine State.

But cash is no longer the only currency in the illicit trade.

Myanmar rebel groups, including the Arakan Army (AA), which controls large parts of Rakhine, are increasingly using yaba and crystal meth to make partial payment for smuggled Bangladeshi goods, according to officials and sources familiar with the trafficking network.

The exchange takes place through maritime routes across the Bay of Bengal, where fishing boats carry Bangladeshi goods to Myanmar and return with narcotics, they said.

According to a source familiar with the trade, Bangladeshi suppliers usually receive half the payment through hundi before shipments leave Bangladesh. Another 25 percent is paid after the consignments depart a Myanmar jetty, while the remaining amount is settled during handover at sea.

Smugglers on the Myanmar side prefer Bangladeshi goods such as cement, pulses and ginger because of acute shortages in conflict-hit Rakhine, the source said.

One trafficking route begins at Ayeik Sit jetty in Myanmar's Ayeyarwady region, where drugs are packed and loaded onto fishing boats before being taken into the Bay of Bengal.

Another starts in Yangon and passes through Minbya, Ann, areas near Sittwe, Rathedaung and Maungdaw before reaching areas close to the Bangladesh border.

"Myanmar-side carriers allegedly use satellite devices to contact Bangladeshi receivers before handing over the consignments mid-sea," the source said, requesting anonymity.

The consignments then enter Bangladesh through different points along the Naf River, the source said.

Confirming the use of yaba as a form of payment by Myanmar rebel groups, Somen Mondol, deputy director of the Department of Narcotics Control (DNC) in Cox's Bazar, said daily essentials were being smuggled from Bangladesh while yaba entered the country in return.

"In many cases, fishing boats cross the border with goods. Later, while returning, they bring yaba in the same boats," he told The Daily Star.

He said hundi had long been used to settle transactions, but the pattern had changed.

"Now, along with hundi, goods are being sent from here, and drugs are coming in return."

Asked who was behind the trade, Somen said a section of Rohingyas was involved, assisted by local groups.

The source, who is familiar with the trade, also shared a wholesale price list for yaba and crystal meth.

According to the list, Diamond-brand yaba sells for Tk 120 per white tablet and Tk 110 per red tablet. Lion-Shingaw sells for Tk 105 per tablet, Seriya for Tk 100, Three Stars for Tk 95 and Zinfore for Tk 115.

Crystal meth, or "ice", sells for Tk 4.5 lakh per kilogram for higher-quality products and Tk 3.5 lakh for lower-grade varieties.

The list showed Diamond to be the most sought-after yaba brand.

The flow of yaba from Myanmar has increased over the past two years after the Arakan Army took control of large stretches of the border, according to officials.

Fighting between Myanmar's military and ethnic armed groups escalated in November 2023. The AA has since reportedly captured nearly 80 percent of Rakhine State. The military later cut off supply lines, triggering severe shortages of food, fuel and construction materials.

"To fill those shortages, the AA now depends heavily on supplies from Bangladesh, offering drugs in exchange," a senior police official monitoring activities along the Myanmar border told The Daily Star on condition of anonymity.

The DNC's Annual Drug Report Bangladesh 2025 also points to a sharp rise in trafficking.

Law enforcement agencies seized 43,562,811 amphetamine-type stimulant (ATS) tablets in 2025, up 90.58 percent from 22,857,751 in 2024. In 2023, the figure stood at 42,977,219.

ATS refers to synthetic stimulant drugs, including methamphetamine-based yaba and MDMA.

DNC Director General Md Hasan Maruf said the growing supply was linked to Myanmar rebel groups using yaba as a “narco-currency”.

SHIPMENT TO MYANMAR

A suspected smuggler has been sending daily commodities, including cement, rice, lentils and edible oil, from Bangladesh to Myanmar at least three times a month and returning with yaba tablets, according to a fisherman who worked on his boat.

The suspect, identified as Khalil Majhi, lives in Manpura, Bhola, but operates a fishing boat between Chattogram port and Myanmar.

The fisherman, who requested anonymity, told The Daily Star that Khalil had been involved in the trade for the past year.

He said each round trip between Chattogram and Myanmar takes around five days. The head boatman receives Tk 3 lakh per trip, while other crew members are paid Tk 30,000 to Tk 40,000 each.

According to the fisherman, fishing nets and fish are kept on the boat’s upper deck. On outbound journeys, daily commodities are stored on the lower deck. On the return trip, fish brought from Myanmar are loaded there, with yaba tablets concealed inside the fish.

Contacted by The Daily Star, Khalil denied any involvement in illegal trade.

“I rented out my boat for the last six months. The person who took it on rent is doing this business. I am not involved in any illegal trade. Once I came to know about the activities, I recently brought the boat back under my control,” he said.

However, Khalil failed to identify the person to whom he claimed to have rented the boat.

SENT ABROAD

The source familiar with the trade with Myanmar rebel groups also claimed that while most of the drugs are consumed in Bangladesh, some consignments are flown to Oman, Saudi Arabia and Dubai through Dhaka and Chattogram airports.

Officials said almost all yaba and crystal meth entering Bangladesh originates in Myanmar, with 80 to 90 percent consumed domestically.

Only small quantities are smuggled abroad through air passengers or courier parcels, mainly to countries with large Bangladeshi migrant populations, a DNC official said on condition of anonymity.

“There have been attempts to send yaba to the Middle East, Europe and the United States, but these are not large-scale trafficking routes,” the official said.

Another DNC intelligence official said such attempts had declined significantly after airports strengthened security through improved scanning systems and CCTV surveillance.

Officials said traffickers had also used courier services to send drugs to the Middle East, Europe, the United States and Australia, but tighter monitoring has made the route increasingly difficult.

CONTINUOUS FLOW

The Border Guard Bangladesh's 64 Battalion guards key stretches of the Naf River along Ukhiya and Teknaf in Cox's Bazar.

Its commanding officer, Lt Col Md Zahirul Islam, said traffickers frequently shifted routes whenever surveillance was tightened, moving through other border points or maritime channels.

"Whenever pressure increases in one area, they look for alternative routes," he said, adding that improved surveillance technology had helped increase yaba seizures.

The BGB said last year that the Arakan Army was directly involved in yaba trafficking and that smuggling had increased through remote areas of Bandarban's Naikhongchhari.

Recent operations by the Bangladesh Navy also point to the scale of the cross-border smuggling network.

On June 26, naval personnel detained 21 alleged smugglers and seized two fishing boats carrying 1,450 sacks of cement in separate operations in the Bay of Bengal.

Earlier that month, on June 2, another operation near Saint Martin's Island led to the arrest of 20 people and the seizure of 1,700 sacks of cement. The detainees told investigators the consignment was bound for Rakhine State, where the materials would fetch high prices.

In February, acting on intelligence about a major customs evasion network, the Navy detained 19 suspected smugglers near Saint Martin's Island and seized 1,140 sacks of cement, 250kg of pulses, 160kg of ginger and 360 bottles of energy drinks.

In another operation in December last year, the Navy detained 11 people and recovered 650 sacks of Bangladeshi cement and 1,000 litres of diesel that were allegedly being smuggled to Myanmar.

Officials said the repeated interceptions reflected the growing demand for

Bangladeshi goods inside conflict-hit Rakhine, where prolonged fighting and military supply restrictions have created acute shortages of essential commodities.

Sources said severe shortages in Rakhine have made Bangladeshi goods extraordinarily valuable. A bag of cement worth around Tk 500 in Bangladesh can reportedly fetch as much as 100,000 Myanmar kyats in conflict-hit areas, generating huge profits that keep cross-border smuggling networks active despite intensified enforcement.

NOT JUST MYANMAR

The use of narcotics as a form of currency is not confined to Myanmar rebel groups.

Officials and law enforcers familiar with anti-drug operations in border areas said similar informal settlement systems are used in the narcotics trade along Bangladesh's border with India.

They said traffickers also exchange narcotics such as Phensedyl, cannabis and heroin for commodities, alongside illegal hundi transactions.

Former Kasba Police Station sub-inspector Faruk Hossain, who served for several years in border areas and took part in multiple anti-drug operations, said traffickers use several covert methods to pay Indian suppliers for narcotics smuggled into Bangladesh.

According to Faruk and DNC officials, most payments are made through illegal hundi networks. Bangladeshi traffickers deposit money with local hundi operators or selected mobile financial service agents, while their counterparts in India receive the equivalent amount in rupees through coded transactions.

They said traffickers also use cash carriers to move money across the border, particularly in frontier areas. In some cases, cash or rupees are handed over directly to suppliers when drug consignments cross the border.

Faruk and DNC officials said payments are sometimes settled through cross-border trafficking of commodities such as gold, hilsa and other contraband instead of cash. In such cases, the value of those goods is adjusted against the price of narcotics supplied from India.

Police Arrest 14 Individuals with Drugs in Various Locations

Kathmandu. A police team on regular patrol has arrested 14 people with drugs from various places in the country.

According to the Central Police Newsroom, they were arrested from various places in Jhapa's Kankai and Damak, Kailali's Tikapur, Morang, Surkhet, and Dang.

From Kankai Municipality-2 in Jhapa, 102 grams 310 milligrams of a substance resembling brown heroin, 7,200 tablets of Tramadol which can only be purchased with a doctor's prescription, and 7,450 tablets of Nitrovet were seized. Azhar Ansari, 27, from Chiptia Tole, Kur sakatta-8, Araria district, Bihar state, India, and Mohammad Ejwal, 28, from Takiya Tole, Kur sakatta-7, were arrested on Saturday.

Similarly, from Damak Municipality-5 in Jhapa, 1 gram 520 milligrams of a substance resembling brown heroin and 4,960 tablets of the controlled drug Tramadol were seized. Buddhi Rai, 34, from Itahari Sub-Metropolitan City-20, Tarahara, Sunsari, Romi Limbu, 23, from Miklajung Rural Municipality-2, Morang, and Karan Mallik, 29, from Damak Municipality-7, Jhapa, were arrested.

From Tikapur Municipality-1 in Kailali, 430 milligrams of a substance resembling brown heroin was seized, and Kris Sharma, 20, from the same place, was arrested. Similarly, from Tikapur Municipality-9, 1 gram 790 milligrams of a substance resembling brown heroin was seized, and Tej Budha, 30, from Tikapur Municipality-7, Beluwa, was arrested.

From Letang Municipality-2, Morang, 27-year-old Pramila Lama was arrested with 150 tablets of Tramadol and 150 tablets of Spasmo-proxyvon. From Pathari Sanischare Municipality-10, Adarsha Tole, Morang, 19 tablets of Tramadol, 28 tablets of Diclofenac, and cash Rs 13,775 were seized. Mika Khatri, 27, and Krishni alias Bandana Makkhim, 27, from Pathari Sanischare Municipality-1, Sundar Basti, were arrested.

From Birendranagar Municipality-9, Latikoili, Surkhet, 720 milligrams of a substance resembling brown sugar was seized, and Rohit Ghising, 24, from the same place, was arrested. From Zero Dam, Birendranagar Municipality-4, 500 milligrams of a substance resembling brown heroin was seized, and Lokendra Bahadur Rawal, 28, from the same place, was arrested. From Bhureli village, Birendranagar Municipality-2, 210 milligrams of a substance resembling brown sugar was seized, and Chitra Thapa, 31, from the same place, was arrested.

Similarly, from Sijswarg Tole, Ghorahi Sub-Metropolitan City-13, Dang, a 17-year-old minor was arrested with 5 grams 110 milligrams of a substance resembling brown heroin, cash Rs 74,000, and one digital scale.

\$20M in cocaine found beneath floorboards of commercial truck trailer at California border

[Federal officers](#) uncovered more than 1,000 pounds of cocaine concealed beneath floorboards on a commercial truck's attached flatbed trailer. The truck arrived at California's Calexico Port of Entry. Authorities estimated the recovered narcotics were worth more than \$20 million. The shipment also included 269 bundles of rebar.

The driver, Jose Manuel Lopez Lopez, was the truck's only occupant, according to federal prosecutors. Lopez, 44, entered the United States from Mexicali, Mexico. Officers arrested him after finding 366 packages within the trailer. The cocaine weighed 1,002.13 pounds, or 454.56 kilograms.

Inspectors find drugs beneath trailer floor

Customs and Border Protection officers X-rayed the attached flatbed during the border inspection. The scan showed anomalies in its wooden floorboards. A drug-sniffing dog then alerted officers to the equipment. Investigators unloaded the rebar before removing the planks.

Officers found packages stuffed beneath those boards, the U.S. Attorney's Office reported. Homeland Security Investigations agents assisted the inquiry. Drug Enforcement Administration personnel also participated in the case. Prosecutors described the amount as "a tremendous amount of drugs, even by the standards of this district."

The recovery marked the Southern District of California's second-largest cocaine seizure during 2026. The larger [May investigation](#) began with a months-long task force inquiry into a supposed retail store near Otay Mesa. Agents later found a [1,933-foot cross-border tunnel](#) stretching from Tijuana to the business. Authorities estimated the passage reached [55 feet deep](#) and included reinforced walls, rails, ventilation and electricity.

Federal prosecutors charged four people after officers seized 1,029.60 kilograms of suspected cocaine, or 2,269.87 pounds. Authorities estimated that May recovery had a value of more than \$45 million. Investigators found the tunnel's exit beneath a storage-room floor at the Buy 4 Less store. A hydraulic lift concealed the access point, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

Driver enters not-guilty plea

Lopez pleaded not guilty during his federal arraignment July 28. U.S. Magistrate Judge Lupe Rodriguez Jr. scheduled his [detention](#) hearing for Aug. 3 at 10 a.m. Court records list the matter as case number 26-mj-08705. Assistant U.S. Attorneys Paul Benjamin and Lawrence Casper are prosecuting the case.

Prosecutors charged Lopez with importing cocaine into the United States. The charge falls under Title 21, U.S. Code, Sections 952 and 960. It carries a mandatory minimum prison term of 10 years. A conviction could bring a maximum sentence of life in prison.

The California Homeland Security Task Force investigated and prosecuted the matter through Operation Take Back America. Customs and Border Protection, Homeland Security Investigations, and the Drug Enforcement Administration handled the investigative work. The federal charge remains an accusation. Lopez is presumed innocent unless proven guilty in court.

Batadrava Police arrested two alleged drug peddlers after seizing 13 grams of suspected narcotics during a routine check in Nagaon district. Investigators are now tracing where the contraband came from and where it was meant to go.

- Police identified the two accused as Afzal Hussain and Saddam Hussain
- Investigators said the contraband was allegedly being moved from Nagaon to Lahorighat

Batadrava Police in Assam's Nagaon district seized 13 grams of suspected banned narcotics and arrested two alleged drug peddlers during a routine checking operation on August 1.

The accused have been identified as Afzal Hussain and Saddam Hussain.

According to police, the narcotics were intercepted while the duo was allegedly transporting the contraband from Nagaon to Lahorighat.

During the operation, police also seized a motorcycle used for transporting the drugs along with two mobile phones from the possession of the accused.

A case has been registered, and further investigation is underway to ascertain the source and intended destination of the seized narcotics.

Mizoram police seize banned Methamphetamine tablets worth Rs 58 crore, 3 arrested

Aizawl, Aug 1 (PTI) In one of Mizoram's biggest drug hauls this year, police have seized 72.51 kg of methamphetamine tablets worth Rs 58.01 crore and arrested three persons in this connection in Saitual district, an official statement said on Saturday.

The seizure was made early on Friday when a special team of the Saitual District Executive Force (DEF), conducting routine vehicle checks at Kualmawi in Keifang, intercepted a truck travelling from Manipur towards Aizawl, about two kilometres south of Saitual police station, the police statement said.

Police said the driver abandoned the vehicle and escaped into the nearby forest moments after the truck was stopped.

Six drug peddlers held in Assam and Manipur; narcotics worth Rs 23 crore seized

Guwahati/Imphal, August 1 (IANS): Assam and Manipur Police, in separate anti-narcotics operations, arrested six alleged drug peddlers, including a woman, and seized a huge quantity of methamphetamine tablets, heroin and brown sugar collectively valued at around Rs 23 crore, officials said on Saturday.

Three of the arrested accused are from Assam, while the remaining three are residents of Manipur.

A senior police official said that personnel of the Special Task Force (STF), along with Assam Police, acting on specific intelligence inputs, intercepted a vehicle at Amingaon, on the outskirts of Guwahati. The vehicle was carrying three occupants from Manipur.

During a thorough search of the vehicle, the police recovered 50,000 highly addictive methamphetamine tablets weighing around 5 kg (excluding the packaging), concealed in specially built secret compartments of the vehicle. The police also recovered five soap cases containing 67.5 grams of heroin (excluding the packaging) from the vehicle. The total value of the seized contraband is estimated at around Rs 12.5 crore in the international illicit drug market.

The three accused, who were arrested on the spot, were identified as Kh Tabish (24), Thekcham Avinash Singh (41), both residents of Thoubal district in Manipur, and Nongmaithem Biswajit (38), a resident of Imphal West district.

Police said methamphetamine tablets, popularly known as Yaba or "party tablets", contain a combination of methamphetamine and caffeine and are widely abused as high-potency narcotics in Bangladesh, Myanmar and several neighbouring countries, besides parts of India.

Law enforcement agencies have also frequently intercepted consignments of Codeine Phosphate-based cough syrup, another substance that is illegally trafficked into Bangladesh. These highly addictive narcotic substances are prohibited under the provisions of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act in India.

Investigators suspect that both the methamphetamine tablets and the heroin were smuggled from Myanmar and transported through Manipur before entering Assam for further distribution. Security agencies have repeatedly expressed concern that Manipur and Mizoram have emerged as major drug trafficking corridors in the Northeast due to their long and largely unfenced international borders with Myanmar.

Mizoram shares an unfenced border of about 510 km with Myanmar and around 318 km with Bangladesh, while Manipur has an approximately 400-km unfenced border with Myanmar, making the region vulnerable to cross-border smuggling of narcotics and other contraband.

Meanwhile, in Manipur, police personnel conducting routine vehicle checks at the Leingangpokpi checkpoint in Jiribam district intercepted a car and arrested its occupant, identified as Bhima Panika (42), a resident of Karbi Anglong district in Assam. During the search, the police recovered 5.21 kg of brown sugar from the vehicle. The seized narcotics are estimated to be worth more than Rs 10 crore in the illegal market.

In another anti-drug operation, Manipur Police arrested Shahna (27), a resident of Kwakta in Bishnupur district, after conducting a search at her residence. During the operation, the police recovered two soap cases containing approximately 70 grams of heroin powder. The value of the seized heroin is estimated at over Rs 55 lakh.

In a separate development, Manipur Police, continuing the investigation into a case registered under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, 1985, at Patsoi Police Station, arrested the main accused, identified as Meraimayum Razak Ahamed (35), a resident of Yairipok Tuliha Mayai Leikai in Imphal East district.

The accused was arrested from his residence in connection with an earlier case involving the recovery of brown sugar from a Pajero SUV that had been found at a vehicle workshop. Police said further investigation is underway to trace the wider network involved in the narcotics trade.

Cocaine delivery through courier services: Nagaland police bust inter-state racket

The Nagaland Police have busted a major inter-state narcotics network that allegedly procured and distributed cocaine through commercial courier and parcel delivery services and arrested five persons, an official statement said.

Investigation found that the network used a structured network of suppliers, handlers and delivery agents. Officials said preliminary findings suggest the network operated in an organised manner, with defined roles covering procurement, payment layering, inter-state transportation, courier-based delivery and local distribution.

The arrested accused were identified as Tohuka Sema, alias Toka (35), alleged to be a major cocaine supplier based in Dimapur; Yeka Awomi (30), who was apprehended in Pune, Bires Kumar (22) and Akhtar Hussain (35), who were apprehended in Delhi, and Swantheiba Inkah (25), alleged to have acted as a delivery agent facilitating the movement of the narcotics.

The police said two other accused, currently believed to be outside Nagaland, were at large and efforts were under way to arrest them. The probe has uncovered alleged inter-state and international linkages, including the suspected involvement of a Nigerian national, the statement said.

The police said further investigation was under way to identify additional associates, trace financial transactions, identify customers and determine the full extent of the trafficking network.

A case has been registered at West police station in Dimapur under the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act, 1985. Around 33 gm of suspected cocaine has also been seized and sent for forensic examination.

Assam man arrested with 5.21 kg of brown sugar in Manipur's Jiribam

A 42-year-old man from Assam was arrested after police allegedly recovered 5.21 kg of brown sugar from a vehicle in Manipur's Jiribam district, officials said on Saturday, Aug 1.

The accused, identified as Bhima Panika, a resident of Panika Basti in Assam's Karbi Anglong district, was apprehended during a vehicle check at Leingangpokpi under Jiribam police station, near the Assam-Manipur border adjoining Cachar district.

According to police, the four-wheeler was intercepted during a routine operation, and a subsequent search led to the recovery of the suspected contraband concealed inside the vehicle.

Panika was taken into custody, and the vehicle used for transporting the narcotics was also seized.

Police have registered a case and launched an investigation to ascertain the source of the brown sugar and its intended destination. Authorities are also probing whether the accused was part of a larger drug trafficking network.

The special investigation team (SIT) constituted by the Kozhikode Rural police has zeroed in on a Wayanad native as part of the continuing probe into the Vadakara synthetic drug trafficking case in which five persons, including three special educators attached to the Perambra Block Resource Centre (BRC), were recently arrested.

Police sources said the investigators had recovered the suspect's bank transaction records and details of phone conversations, which were being examined as key evidence to trace the financial network behind the alleged drug racket. The arrested were reportedly in frequent contact with the Wayanad native, who is suspected to have played a role in facilitating the illegal trade.

District Police Chief (Kozhikode Rural) Merin Joseph said details of the investigation could not be disclosed now. Ms. Joseph, however, confirmed on Saturday (August 1, 2026) that the alleged kingpin of the network, who was absconding, would be arrested soon.

Police sources said details of the alleged drug racket were expected to emerge after securing the custody of the accused again for the remaining phase of interrogation. The SIT would strive to expose the inter-State gang operating behind local networks, they added.

Meanwhile, the General Education department has ordered an inquiry into the alleged involvement of the three special educators attached to the Perambra BRC in the drug case. A special committee has been formed to examine the allegations and examine the reported irregularities in the functioning of the BRC.

Panel to prepare report

The committee, headed by a senior Samagra Shiksha Keralam official, has been directed to complete the inquiry on priority basis and submit a report to the government. According to Education department sources, the panel members will prepare the report after visiting the Perambra BRC and neighbouring BRCs to collect evidence and verify relevant records.

The three special educators arrested in the case are K.C. Keerthana, K. Kavya, and V.P. Neeshma, who allegedly worked as financial intermediaries for drug traffickers. Their suspected role surfaced following the arrest of Safwan, the first accused in the case, from Vadakara. Jijin Kuriakose, an online delivery worker from Iritty, was also arrested for allegedly colluding with the rural drug network.

Police sources said several other suspected intermediaries who colluded with the drug traffickers' networks would be interrogated in the days to come on the basis of the already gathered digital evidence and the statements of the arrested.

Kidnap probe exposes drug gang; 10 held in separate operations across Kochi

KOCHI: An investigation into the alleged abduction of a youth from outside Forum Mall in Maradu has led Kochi City police to unravel what they describe as a major narcotics network operating across the city and neighbouring districts, resulting in multiple arrests and the seizure of MDMA.

According to officers, the incident occurred around 9.50pm on Wednesday, when a scooterist was allegedly abducted by a group travelling in a car. One of the accused also rode away on the victim's scooter. Although no formal complaint was initially lodged, a kidnapping case was filed at Maradu police station based on the statement of a food delivery man who witnessed the incident.

A special investigation team was constituted the same night under the supervision of the Kochi police commissioner. CCTV footage helped investigators identify the vehicle used in the crime, which was found to be registered in the name of V P Shahnas, a Palakkad native and an accused in a narcotics case.

Further probe revealed the involvement of Francis Xavier, of Thoppumpady, who had been externed under Kaapa and is accused in several criminal cases, and Kannur native Anoop. Police said the kidnapping stemmed from a financial dispute over a drug transaction.

H-NEW busts inter-state drug racket, two arrested in Hyderabad

Hyderabad: The Hyderabad Narcotics Enforcement Wing (H-NEW), in coordination with the Hussainialam police, busted an inter-state drug trafficking network and arrested two persons, including a local drug peddler and a drug transporter.

The police seized 120 grams of OG (hydroponic cannabis), 5 grams of cocaine, 27 LSD blots, two mobile phones, and a Maruti Suzuki Baleno car (TG12-8766) used for transporting the contraband.

The arrested persons were identified as Mohammed Saif (31), a resident of Babri Alawa, Charminar, and Sameer Babubhai Waghela (25), a resident of Kurla West, Mumbai.

According to the police, Saif allegedly procured the narcotic substances from a Mumbai-based supplier, identified as Aditya, through Sameer, who acted as the transporter. After receiving the consignments in Hyderabad, Saif allegedly distributed the drugs to consumers through his local network and earned huge illegal profits.

“Saif was allegedly drug trafficking and also addicted to consuming OG, cocaine and LSD. Sameer allegedly functioned as an intermediary, transporting narcotic consignments from Mumbai to Hyderabad on behalf of the absconding supplier,” said the officials. Efforts are underway to trace Aditya and identify other members of the interstate drug trafficking network, the official added.

Two persons held with 37 kg ganja in Kerala

Kochi, Aug 1 (PTI) Two people from West Bengal were arrested for possessing 37 kg of ganja in North Paravur near here as part of the anti-narcotics drive 'Operation Toofan', police said on Saturday.

The arrested were identified as Sabuj Sheikh (19) and Raja Sheikh (20), both natives of Murshidabad district in West Bengal.

The accused were arrested by a joint team of the Erankulam Rural District Anti-Narcotics Special Action Force (DANSAF) and North Paravur police, officials said.

The duo had alighted from a train at Chalakudy railway station carrying the contraband and hired an online taxi to reach North Paravur in an attempt to avoid police surveillance.

The ganja was found packed in separate packets and concealed inside clothes in their travel bags.

According to the police, the accused procured the ganja from Odisha at around Rs 3,000 per kg and sold it in Kerala for more than 10 times the purchase price.

The duo used to bring the contraband to Kerala, sell it on the same day and return immediately.

Police are also probing people who purchased the ganja from the accused, they said.

Officials said around 550 kg of ganja has been seized in the Ernakulam Rural Police limit so far this year.

As many as 445 people have been arrested in around 360 cases registered this year, officials added.

Jalgaon police seize 62g mephedrone worth Rs 2.9 lakh, arrest one

New Delhi [India], August 1 (ANI): Delhi High Court transferred six judges to Rouse Avenue Court as [Special Exclusive NIA Judges](#) on Saturday. These judges include Anu Grover Baliga, Vikas Dhull, Prashant Sharma, Amit Bansal, Kiran Bansal and Pulastya Pramachala. The judges will take charge with effect from August 4 of Special Exclusive NIA Courts at Rouse Avenue as per an order issued by the Delhi High Court. New NIA courts have been constructed at the Rouse Avenue Court. These courts are to be inaugurated on Monday.

The Courts under the Maharashtra Control of Organised Crime Act (MCOCA) and the NDPS have also been set up at the Rouse Avenue Court. A special NDPS court will also function from another court complex. Earlier, the NIA courts were situated at Patiala House Court. MCOCA and NDPS courts were working from all District courts of Delhi. Additional Sessions Judge (ASJ) Prashant Sharma was hearing NIA cases against Hafiz Saeed, PFI leaders, Ukraine and US nationals, etc.

As per the order issued by the Delhi High Court, a total of 151 judges have been transferred. 13 judges have been transferred to Rouse Avenue Court as Special Exclusive judges under special Acts of NIA, MCOCA and NDPS.

Special CBI (MP-MLA) judge Jitendra Singh has been transferred to the family court at Tis Hazari Court. He had discharged Arvind Kejriwal and other accused in the Liquor Policy CBI case in February 2026. He took charge of this court in October 2024. He has been transferred before a period of 2 years.

Special Judge (MP-MLA) Court Vishal Gogne has been transferred from Rouse Avenue to Dwarka as Additional Principal Judge, Family Court. Special Judge Anu Grover Baliga was transferred to the Special NIA Court from the newly set-up court for paper leak cases. Special Ajay Gupta will hold the court of paper leak case. Four judges, namely Sandeep Yadav, Anuradha Shukla, Devendra Kumar Sharma, and Bhupinder Singh, were transferred to Rouse Avenue Court as Special Exclusive Judges (NDPS).

Three Judges namely Gaurav Rao, Gagandeep Singh, and Surbhi Sharma Vats, have been transferred to Rouse Avenue Court as Special Exclusive Judges (MCOCA). Additional Sessions Judge (ASJ) Sheetal Chaudhary Pradhan has been transferred from Saket Court to Labour Court at Rouse Avenue Court Complex. She conducted hearings in money laundering cases against Jawad Ahmad Siddiqui. Additional Sessions Judge (ASJ) Ekta Gauba Mann has been transferred to the Delhi High Court as Registrar (Judicial) from the office of the Principal District and Sessions Judge (HQ), Tis Hazari Court. DRI seizes significant quantities of gold; drugs, e-cigarettes and other contraband in pan-India Ops; 20 persons, including 5 foreign nationals, arrested

New Delhi [India], August 1 (ANI): Continuing its sustained drive against organised smuggling networks and transnational trafficking syndicates, the Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) has carried out a series of intelligence-led operations across the country during the week, resulting in the seizure of foreign-origin gold, heroin, MDMA, hydroponic weed, red sanders, prohibited wildlife products, e-cigarettes, foreign-origin poppy seeds and areca nuts, Ministry of Finance said. These operations led to the arrest of 20 persons, including 5 foreign nationals, involved in smuggling and trafficking activities and exposed sophisticated concealment techniques employed by organised criminal syndicates.

On 29.07.26, in a significant operation at Indira Gandhi International Airport, New Delhi, officers of DRI intercepted two foreign nationals who had arrived from Dubai. Examination of the passenger trolley revealed a specially created secret cavity fabricated using a steel sheet matching the dimensions of the trolley and secured with double-sided adhesive tapes. The cavity yielded 40 foreign-origin gold bars weighing 4 kg. The gold was seized, and both passengers were arrested.

Previously in the week, in separate operations conducted jointly by DRI and Border Security Force personnel along the Indo-Bangladesh border, officers seized around 3.2 kg of foreign-origin gold. The gold was recovered from a person near the border fence at Tungi, another person at Hili border gate, and in a third case from a person on a motorcycle intercepted near Nityanandakati, Hakimpur. Three persons, including a woman, were arrested in connection with the seizures. In addition to the above cases, DRI officers also seized around 2.2 kg of gold in three different operations conducted at Varanasi, Delhi Airport and Tamil Nadu and arrested 4 persons. In total, around 9.5 kg gold valued at around Rs. 14 crore was seized and 9 persons arrested.

Also, in a significant case involving prohibited imports, officers of DRI uncovered an attempt to import around 14 metric tonnes of Pakistan-origin Guggul resin valued at Rs. 1.4 crore approx. through misdeclaration of description and country of origin. The consignment had been falsely declared as natural resin originating from Somalia and routed through Dubai. Guggul resin (*Commiphora* resin), a species endemic to the arid regions of India and Pakistan, is listed in CITES Appendix II and is categorised as Critically Endangered in the IUCN Red List. Investigation established that the consignment was Guggul resin and was of Pakistan origin and had been trans-shipped using forged documentation.

The import is in violation of DGFT restrictions prohibiting direct or indirect import of goods originating in or exported from Pakistan. Two persons involved in the conspiracy were arrested. In another major wildlife and forest produce smuggling case, officers of DRI intercepted a truck on the outskirts of Chennai and recovered 142 red sanders logs weighing around 4.8 metric tonnes, concealed behind empty plastic crates. Red Sanders is a protected species listed under Appendix II of CITES and covered under the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972. The seized consignment is valued at approximately Rs 2.50 crore. Investigation revealed the involvement of an organised smuggling network with a history of illicit exports. Three persons were arrested.

In Manipur, acting on specific intelligence regarding cross-border narcotics trafficking from Myanmar, officers of DRI, with assistance from Assam Rifles and Manipur Police, intercepted a vehicle near Churachandpur and recovered around 2.7 kg heroin concealed inside 220 soap cases. Two persons were arrested.

In two other operations in Mumbai, DRI officers intercepted two foreign female nationals travelling from Delhi and recovered synthetic narcotic drugs concealed in specially fabricated cavities in their respective baggage. The operations resulted in the collective seizure of around 2 kg of amphetamine crystals and MDMA tablets. Both passengers were arrested under the NDPS Act, 1985. In two different operations, at Indira Gandhi International Airport, New Delhi and Calicut International Airport, DRI officers intercepted two passengers, including a foreign national around 25 kg of hydroponic weed was seized from their possession. Both passengers had travelled from Bangkok and were arrested. In another operation aimed at curbing the illicit import of prohibited goods, officers of DRI intercepted an import consignment at Nhava Sheva Port that had been mis-declared as LED lights and fixtures and recovered 9,230 prohibited electronic cigarettes of various brands and flavours. Electronic cigarettes are prohibited in India under the Prohibition of Electronic Cigarettes Act, 2019. The prohibited e-cigarettes, along with the cover cargo, having a total value of approximately Rs 3.70 crore, were seized.

In Mizoram, officers of DRI, assisted by Assam Rifles personnel, searched four suspected godowns near the Indo-Myanmar border and recovered around 14.5 MT of poppy seeds and 14 MT of areca nuts, both of foreign origin, collectively valued at around Rs 3.6 crore.

Preliminary investigation indicates that the goods had been smuggled into India through the Zokhawthar sector of the Indo-Myanmar border. The goods were seized under the Customs Act, 1962. Poppy seeds are classified as a "Restricted" item under the Foreign Trade Policy, and its imports is permitted only subject to specified conditions, including import of legally cultivated produce from designated countries and mandatory registration of all import contracts with the Narcotics Commissioner, Gwalior.

Rs 20-cr cocaine racket busted; two Nigerian women held

New Delhi: Two Nigerian women were arrested with over 2 kilograms of cocaine worth around Rs 20 crore after the Delhi Police's Railway Unit busted an alleged interstate drug trafficking network operating between Mumbai and Delhi-NCR, an officer said on Saturday.

The seizure was made during a joint anti-narcotics drive by the Special Staff of the Railway Unit and police personnel from Hazrat Nizamuddin Railway Station on July 31, the officer said.

Police identified the accused as Chikanso James (43) and Happiness Okoye (41), both Nigerian nationals. "Teams were deployed at vulnerable locations, including major railway stations, to intercept suspected traffickers and peddlers. During intensive patrolling at platform number 1 of Hazrat Nizamuddin Railway Station, a police team noticed two women carrying luggage and behaving suspiciously," Deputy Commissioner of Police (Railway) B Bharat Reddy said.

After the team alerted senior officers, police initiated mandatory legal proceedings under the NDPS Act. During the search of the suspected women, officers recovered 11 packets containing cocaine from one of the accused.

"The seizure was a major success in the Railway Unit, disrupting an alleged interstate supply network operating between Mumbai and Delhi-NCR and preventing a substantial quantity of contraband from reaching the illegal market," the officer said.

During sustained interrogation, Chikanso James disclosed that the seized cocaine was collected from west Delhi's Vaspuri area. Police said efforts are underway to trace the operation's financial trail and establish both backward and forward linkages of the network to uncover the larger interstate narcotics syndicate.

Investigators are examining whether the accused acted as couriers or were directly linked to an organised drug distribution network operating across Mumbai and Delhi and other states.

Police said co-accused Okoye was remanded to judicial custody and they seized both accused individuals' passports.

The Counter Intelligence (CI) wing of the Punjab Police has arrested an alleged operative of an organised drug smuggling network and recovered 20 kg of heroin from his possession in Amritsar.

The accused, identified as Om Sharma, a resident of Jhabal in Tarn Taran district, was allegedly working on the instructions of a foreign-based handler linked to Pakistan-backed cross-border smugglers. Police also impounded a car (PB46AJ6021), allegedly used for transporting narcotics.

While sharing the information, Director General of Police (DGP) Gaurav Yadav said that preliminary investigations revealed that Sharma's role was to retrieve heroin consignments dropped by drones in border areas and deliver them to traffickers operating across Punjab.

He said the CI, Amritsar, had received specific intelligence that associates of a foreign-based handler were using drones to smuggle heroin from Pakistan into the Ajnala border belt. The consignments were allegedly handed over to Sharma, who further distributed the drugs within the state.

Acting on the intelligence, police intercepted Sharma near the Sohian Kalan grain market on Fatehgarh Churian road and recovered 20 kg of heroin from his possession before he could deliver the consignment to another operative.

Police officials are now probing the forward and backward linkages of the network to identify other members of the syndicate and establish possible connections with other smuggling modules.

A case has been registered under Sections 21, 25 and 29 of the NDPS Act at the State Special Operation Cell Police Station, Amritsar. Further investigation is underway.

SAMBA, Aug 1: In a major breakthrough in its sustained campaign against drug trafficking, Samba Police has arrested two lady drug peddlers and recovered approximately 100 grams of heroin- (Chitta) from their possession within the jurisdiction of Police Station (PS) Vijaypur.

Acting promptly on reliable information, a police team from Police Station (PS) Vijaypur launched a swift operation and intercepted two women pedestrians on Tarapur road who were moving towards the Vijaypur side under suspicious circumstances. During frisking, approximately 100 grams of heroin- (Chitta) was recovered from their possession.

The lady drug peddlers were identified as Noora Jan, wife of Mohd Yaqoob @ Yooqa daughter of Masoom Ali of Sarore and Noor Jahan, wife of Mohd Yaqoob @ Yooqa daughter of Miya Bashir of Rakh Barotian, both presently residing at Rahya tehsil Vijaypur district Samba. They have been arrested and the contraband item has also been seized on the spot by the police.

Police said a case FIR No. 133/2026 U/S 8/21/22/29 NDPS Act was registered at Police Station, Vijaypur and investigation started to ascertain the forward and backward linkages so that the entire drug network involved can be unearthed.

During the course of investigation, it has also come to light that Mohd Yaqoob @ Yooqa, the husband of both accused, is a notorious drug peddler and is involved in 17 cases under the NDPS Act and other criminal offences registered at various police stations in the districts of Jammu, Samba and Reasi. Investigation is also underway to examine his linkages with the entire drug network.

SSP Samba reiterated that District Police Samba remains fully committed to its relentless war against drugs and will continue to take stringent action against drug peddlers and traffickers to make the district drug-free. He emphasized that no individual involved in narcotics-related activities will be spared under the law.

In another case Samba Police arrested a drug peddler and recovering approximately 30.42 grams of heroin- (Chitta) from his possession within the jurisdiction of Police Station (PS) Ramgarh.

Acting on information received from reliable sources, a police team from Police Station Ramgarh laid a vehicle checking naka near Rakh Rara link road and intercepted a car bearing Registration Number JK02CC-6143 which was coming from Jakh and moving towards Rara. During search and checking, approximately 30.42 grams of heroin- (Chitta) was recovered from the possession of the driver of the vehicle.

The drug peddler identified as Vinod Kumar, son of Krishan Singh of Ambaran tehsil Akhnoor district Jammu has been arrested and the contraband item along with vehicle has also been seized by the police.

A case FIR No. 54/2026 U/S 8/21/22/25 NDPS Act was registered at Police Station, Ramgarh and further investigation is underway to uncover the forward and backward linkages of the narcotics network.

The action was carried out as part of the Samba Police's ongoing anti-drug campaign aimed at dismantling drug networks and curbing the menace of narcotics in the district.

A house in the Gurunanakpura locality of Fatehabad was allegedly being used as a heroin (chitta) sale and consumption centre, the police said after raiding the premises and arresting 16 people, including a woman, on Saturday. A minor, who allegedly supplied the drug, was apprehended under the Juvenile Justice Act.

The Fatehabad police conducted the raid on a tip-off that youths regularly gathered at the house to buy and consume heroin. A police team raided the premises under the supervision of SP Nikita Khattar.

As per the police, 15 youths, a woman and a minor were found inside a room on the upper floor of the house. They allegedly tried to escape on seeing the police, but were caught on the spot.

During questioning, the accused allegedly told police that they pooled money to purchase heroin from the minor and consumed it together at the house.

The police recovered 5.64 gm of heroin, 25 lighters, 18 silver foil sheets and 15 makeshift pipes made from rolled currency notes, all allegedly used for consuming the drug.

A case has been registered at the Fatehabad City police station under Sections 21(B), 27A, 61 and 85 of the NDPS Act. The police said further investigation is underway to identify the source of heroin and uncover the wider network behind the alleged drug trade operating from the house.

While Punjab grapples with drug scourge, drug recovery data of Punjab police reveals concerning details of prevailing drug menace in the state.

Shocking as it may seem, Punjab police are arresting nearly as many as 145 drug peddlers and recovering nearly 6.7kg of heroin each day since the launch of its drive 'Yudh Nashian Virudh' 17 months ago.

Punjab Police data states that in all 54,916 first information reports (FIRs) were registered, leading to the arrest of 75,102 drug smugglers and recovery of 3472 kg heroin since March 1, 2025.

Director General of Police (DGP) Punjab Gaurav Yadav said that the Punjab police has been conducting operations simultaneously in all the 28 Police districts of the state since the launch of this anti-drug drive 'Yudh Nashian Virudh' launched 17 months ago.

Apart from the recovery of 3472 kg haul of heroin, Special DGP Law and Order Praveen Sinha said that police have also seized 871 kg opium, 425 quintals poppy husk, 86 kg charas, 1193 kg ganja, 60 kg ICE, 60.78 lakh intoxicant pills/tablets, and Rs 21.64 crore drug money.

On day 518, Punjab Police arrested 91 drug smugglers on Saturday and recovered 20.3 kg heroin, 15,249 intoxicant tablets/capsules and Rs 3800 drug money from their possession. As part of De-addiction, the Punjab Police has convinced 11 persons to undergo de-addiction and rehabilitation treatment today.

Three held with heroin in Tarn Taran

Drug testing college students: IITs, IIMs begin with voluntary urine tests at admission

Under directions from the Union government, higher educational institutions across India, starting with IITs and IIMs this year, have begun suggesting that incoming students submit a voluntary urine test for drugs such as amphetamines, cocaine, marijuana, benzodiazepines, and phencyclidine (PCP) with their admission paperwork.

According to government officials and admission documents for incoming students, the test is voluntary and is to be taken on the understanding that it will be kept confidential, is anonymised, and will not influence the student's admission.

This initiative by the Education Ministry's Department of Higher Education is part of the Union government's broader efforts to tackle narcotics in the country, as outlined in the Narcotics Control Bureau's 'Vision Document on Narcotics Control 2026-29' — a key strategy of which is to screen around 10 lakh students across 170 centrally-funded higher education institutes for drugs in the next three years in a phased manner. The vision document has characterised the misuse of psychoactive substances among students in colleges and universities as "a growing health concern".

PM to launch scheme

The mission to screen 10 lakh students by 2029 for drugs and substance use comes just as the government is finalising the questions for its next and most expansive yet survey of substance users across India, the results for which will be expected over the next few years. Further, Prime Minister Narendra Modi is scheduled to launch the 'Nasha Mukta Yuva for Viksit Bharat Sankalp Abhiyan' on Sunday (August 2, 2026), which is meant to "inspire youth to stay away from substance abuse".

Government officials told *The Hindu* that the basic guidelines for drug testing of college and university students were provided by the National Drug Dependence Treatment Centre at the All India Institute of Medical Sciences in New Delhi. Under this framework, the test is meant to be strictly voluntary and confidential, cannot result in any "negative repercussions on the students taking it whatsoever", and should be kept for counselling purposes only.

According to the brochure issued to the incoming 2026-28 batch of MBA students at IIM Lucknow, the Department of Higher Education has required that the urine test drug panel should be conducted at an NABL-certified laboratory within seven days of submitting the report. It further said that the students should submit the report in a closed envelope marked "confidential" for the eyes of the student wellness committee alone.

A similar document issued to incoming B.Tech students at the Indian Institute of Technology in Goa has noted that the test is voluntary and confidential in nature, and that the Ministry of Education had designed it “primarily for preventive health and support”. The IIT Goa admissions document added that any findings from the submitted tests will not affect “academic status, admission, or hostel eligibility” and “shall not lead to disciplinary measures, suspension, or any form of expulsion”.

IIM Lucknow’s brief for students, however, says that the test results will not affect admission but does not explicitly mention that students will not face any negative repercussions during their time at the institute.

Three-phase programme

This drug screening programme is being implemented in three phases, with IITs, IIMs, and one central university starting this year under the first phase. The following year (2027-28), the government has planned to take the screenings to 32 NITs, eight IISERs, three SPAs, 25 IIITs, and four centrally-funded technical institutes. This will be followed by taking the programme into 46 central universities and four deemed-to-be-universities during 2028-29.

Apart from the screenings, the vision document for drug demand reduction among the youth outlines plans to start declaring university and college campuses and the areas around them as “drug-free” and training teachers on prevention of substance abuse.

गिरफ्तार आरोपी हरियाणा के जनपद जिंद के थाना नरवाला के गांव डोबी का रहने वाला हैं। उसके खिलाफ हरियाणा, राजस्थान के विभिन्न थानों में गंभीर धाराओं के 19 मामले दर्ज हैं। नशीले पदार्थों का वह बड़ा तस्कर है। वर्ष 2011 में हरियाणा के थाना रतिया में हत्या व डकैती, साजिश का मामला दर्ज है। इस मामले में उसे सजा हुई थी।
